Another beauty from the camera of Jane Millinchip. Taken on one of Jane's many visits to Arley Hall & Gardens, it's the fountain in the centre of the pond in the Walled Garden. The intriguing and inspired artichoke design of this water feature means that water, pumped up through the centre, collects in the spreading leaves of the flower and gradually trickles back to source, catching the sunlight as it flows. The fountain was a gift from the Friends of Arley in memory of Elizabeth, Lady Ashbrook (1911-2002).

If you'd like to see the fountain, note that from 1^{st} March – 31^{st} October, Arley Gardens are open daily from 10.00am – 5.00pm.

A verse for MARCH

Isaiah Ch 43: verse 20

"For I give water in the wilderness, rivers in the desert."

Water is everywhere you look - the sea, the lake, river, ocean, rain, snow, kitchen, bathroom. And it has a lot of different meanings for us. So it's not surprising that water is an important symbol in the Bible.

In both the Old and New Testaments, the word water is used as a symbol for salvation and **eternal life**, which God offers us through faith in his Son. Another symbolism of water in the Bible is that of **spiritual cleansing** that we undergo when we accept God's offer of salvation. Water in the Bible is used to symbolise **difficult times** in life, especially for us, God's children. Water is a symbol of **God's spirit and power**.

I wonder what Bible story comes to your mind when you think about water? And what you think its symbolic meaning might be? Is it symbolic of God's power? Or of the promise of eternal life? Of the difficult times we face? Or the cleansing power of God's forgiveness?

Is there a special story or verse about water which brings you particular comfort?

March thoughts from the Assistant Curate

The season of Lent is well under way. "Lent" comes from the Old English word "Lencten" meaning "Spring season" or "lengthening of days". Daylight is already three hours longer than at the start of the year. As I sit in my study writing this, I am indeed enjoying the sunshine, the bright blue sky, and the sheep in the field next to me. Warm Summer days are slowly getting nearer.



But before those Summer days, there are the forty days of wilderness to contend with. If Lent feels like a struggle for you, you're not alone. I grew up in a strict Roman Catholic Church and I have two ingrained memories of Lent: the first is the overwhelming guilt of being an unworthy sinner, and the second, the almost competitive nature of "giving something up". Both aspects contain an element of truth, but sadly, miss the point of Lent. At the age of six, I remember giving up milk and sugar in coffee and tea for Lent, and all my friends comparing the items they would forgo. Lent might be a time to give up that bar of chocolate or odd glass of wine, but it isn't what Lent is about.

The point isn't about giving something up but, in some small way, spending time with Jesus in the wilderness. Forced into the wilderness by the Holy Spirit, the only thing Jesus had was time to reflect and pray. We can never fully understand what Jesus went through, but in giving up something we can at least begin to appreciate his struggle, to share in his humanity and glimpse his great love for us.

We share also in his reliance on God. Jesus spent a great deal of time in prayer, discerning God's will and asking for strength before his ministry began – a ministry journey that would lead to the cross. The overwhelming guilt I felt as a child has gone. I know I am a sinner, but I also know that God's grace, mercy, and love is bigger! I know God has a purpose for me, for all of us. But how will we know that purpose unless we are intentional in taking the time to listen? When things get difficult, and we're tempted to give up, where do we find our strength? When Jesus faced temptation, each time he was able to rely on Scripture, correctly quoting Deuteronomy 6:13, 6:16 and 8:3 against Satan's manipulation of Psalm 91:11,12.

Michael Leyden, the Dean of Emmanuel Theological College (where I trained) insisted that, as well as regular times of daily prayer, we read the Bible coverto-cover each year, reading a good four chapters every day. This was followed by "The day you stop doing this... go home!" I have to say, it was excellent advice. Setting aside regular time soon becomes an enjoyable habit. Now it's what gets me through the day! (That, and black coffee!) If the thought of a regular pattern of prayer and Bible reading seems daunting, you don't have to journey through the wilderness alone. If you've not yet attended the Lent course (on Wednesday evenings in the Mews), it's not too late to join in.

Alternatively, I will be starting a new (fortnightly) fellowship group on Monday evenings in the Mews after Easter. This is an excellent opportunity to develop good habits of Bible reading and prayer while sharing fellowship and cake! Please see the advert on Page 11 for more details. I am always happy to chat, help or share resources – just ask! If you're looking for ideas, I've included the books I'm reading this Lent- all available on Amazon for super quick delivery!



Wherever you are on the journey, this Lent, I pray God will lead us through the wilderness, help us develop good habits and grow in grace.

Bishop Mark recently announced that the Reverend Jane Proudfoot has been appointed as the next Archdeacon of Macclesfield.

Jane is currently the Rector of Grappenhall, Priest in charge of Daresbury, and Rural Dean of Great Budworth in this Diocese. Since September, she has been serving as Assistant Archdeacon of Macclesfield.

She will be licensed in a service in Chester Cathedral on the afternoon of 28th April with a welcome service in the Archdeaconry to follow.


AND FROM CHESTER CATHEDRAL
