The King's Arms. This painting on wood, set high above the Baptistry at St Mary's was introduced in 1660, at a cost of £3 10s 6d to replace a previous version that was almost certainly destroyed during the Commonwealth. The artist who created it was Richard Bankes, who was awarded his fee "for drawing the Kinges Armes and for bringing them to the churche".

The church in Whitegate owes its existence of course to the monarchy: to the fact that Edward I chose to build here the great Cistercian Abbey of Vale Royal, and the small chapel outside the white monastery gate ultimately became St Mary's Church. King Edward, his wife Queen Eleanor and their son, Alfonso, came with a huge entourage to Vale Royal and laid the foundation stone in August 1277. One wonders if any other monarchs have visited, or even passed through the parish during the 746 years that have elapsed since that time.

Just as Edward I, his 20x great-grandfather was, King Charles III is to be crowned in Westminster Abbey and as you see on page 7 of the newsletter, from 4^{th} – 7^{th} May there are plans to celebrate here in Whitegate. Everyone is invited.

A verse for May

In Luke 15, Jesus tells the story of a strong-willed young man who turns his back on his family to make his own way in the world, but who eventually realises that he has messed up, and goes back home to his father, who welcomes him with open arms.

At some point in our lives, we too have messed up, "through ignorance, through weakness, through our own deliberate fault". We can't imagine that God could ever be interested in us when he knows the sort of people we are.

But the good news is that we don't have to (and can't) earn God's love. Just as the wayward young man came home to say sorry for what he had done, so all God asks of us is that we turn to him in repentance and faith. God's unconditional love is called grace, the amazing grace which "saved a wretch like me".

May thoughts from the Vicar



I hope you have been finding the Daily Prayers preparing for the Coronation of King Charles III helpful. In the days running up to Saturday 6th May the daily themes are Patience, Kindness, Generosity, Faithfulness, Gentleness and Self-Control. These are gifts of the Spirit and, God willing, hallmarks of our life as a nation. They are also of course marks of authentic Christian living which we aspire to as individuals. It is people who make community.

There is much going on within our communities to mark and celebrate the Coronation. Thank you to those who have given of their time, skill, energy and commitment to make these events possible.

Our benefice diary has been adapted to reflect the events of this month, so please check the details as services have been changed from our usual pattern. The Sunday following the weekend of the Coronation is Rogationtide. There is a connection between these events.

The word Rogation comes from the Latin *rogare*, meaning 'to ask'. We ask God's blessing on the soil, the seed, the growing crops, and those who work the land. Just as we ask God's blessing on our King and our nation. King Charles has often trodden a fine line between remaining neutral and speaking his mind. We know that he has a strong concern for, and commitment to, a sustainable agricultural economy.

So I want to focus on two hallmarks of authentic Christian living which pertain to our asking for God's blessing. But first just a note of what 'blessing' means. At its most fundamental level 'blessing' means to 'speak well of', or to 'do good to'. A blessing isn't something magical that makes life better. To bless someone is to think well of them, speak well of them, do good for them.

The two hallmarks in my mind are Faithfulness and Gentleness.

Faithfulness is always about being resilient and steadfast through life's ups and downs, its joys and sorrows. To be faithful doesn't just mean believing when believing is easy. We all have good days. Days when the sun shines and we sense God's presence with us. Times when things go well and we are free from anxiety or trouble. These are the 'mountain top days'. Days when we stand high and see everything clearly.

But not every day can be a mountain top day. We go down from the mountain into the valleys, where the way is shadowed, the path isn't clear, there may be darkness and uncertainty.

Faith is about holding fast to that which we glimpsed from the mountain top, remembering the direction we saw, and steering our path through the darkness holding onto that which we glimpsed.

It is like the lifeboat skipper steering his crew through the storm remembering where he'd seen the lighthouse flash and holding that course through the ensuing darkness and chaos.

Faithfulness is something we glimpse on special days, but live every day. Faithfulness is about tenacity and resilience.

Then Gentleness. One of my heroes is Edward King who was Principal of Cuddesdon Theological College, then Professor of Pastoral Theology at Oxford before being made Bishop of Lincoln until his death on 8th March 1910. One of his favourite texts was Psalm 18:35, "*Thy right hand supported me and thy gentleness made me great."*

The Psalmist, looking back over his life, realised that it was not through his own cleverness, strength or ingenuity by which he had achieved anything, but rather through the gentleness of God. God's 'gentleness' is otherwise translated as 'help', or as King often reflected, 'loving correction'.

Francis de Sales wrote, "Nothing is so strong as gentleness – nothing so loving and gentle as strength." When King spoke at his brother's funeral he used this text 'thy gentleness has made me great' to reflect upon the strength and courage displayed in his brother's life.

This strength and courage had enabled his brother to live with fearless independence doing his duty with indifference to public opinion. It enabled a life which made time for the needs of others with disregard for personal ambition or gain. A life which was alert to those in trouble or disadvantaged, for no other reason than a genuine care for their wellbeing and welfare.

King pointed out that the same word 'gentleness' can be read as 'loving correction'. The Psalmist reminds us that we know our potential to be better, to hold to a higher standard, to aspire to walk closer with God.

In the values of life spoken and represented in the Coronation of a King, and in the asking for God's blessings on our land, the toil of our hands, in the shaping of policy and furtherment of research, we are opening ourselves to gentleness, God's loving correction. It is in striving to be better that goodness happens and greatness emerges.

Stories from the Churchyard

Rupert Oscar "Jack" Newall (16.06.1921 - 24.03.1945)

Having lived all his life in Whitegate, Tony Newall is very well known in the village. He attended Whitegate School and has a long-standing association with Whitegate Rovers Football Club, formerly as a key player and now as President. A few years ago, Tony was Guest of Honour at the



village fair when he gave a very interesting talk on his memories of the village, particularly during the 1940s and 50s. He recently told me that St Mary's Church has been the hub of his entire life. A few years ago, after I had read out the Whitegate Roll of Honour during our Remembrance Service, Tony told me that he believed one of our Fallen, LCpl Rupert Newall, Airborne Division, was related to him. I promised to look into it and research Rupert's history. It turned out that Rupert was the cousin of Tony's father. What follows, is the story I uncovered...

Born in 1921, Rupert Oscar "Jack" Newall lived with his parents, Frank and Ethel, and younger brother Douglas, in a house provided by the Salt Works at Knights Grange Works, a small cluster of houses which was in close proximity to Meadowbank, opposite the Salt Works War Memorial. Frank was employed as a shipwright in one of the Salt Works boat houses on the River Weaver where the building and maintenance of their barges was carried out. By 1939, Rupert had followed his father into the boat house as an apprentice joiner. Over the same period, he was a popular member of the Meadowbank Methodist Church, where he was both organist and Sunday school teacher.

Shortly after the outset of WW2, Rupert joined the Corps of Military Police, just as I did 20-odd years later. After training in Aldershot, Rupert volunteered for airborne forces and in 1943 attended parachute training at RAF Ringway. His course report described him as "exceptionally keen and hardworking".

The first Military Policemen to land in Normandy dropped by parachute with 6 Airborne Division across the Orne River on D-Day, 6 June 1944, and Rupert was one of them. The MPs' duties were mine detecting, clearing barbed wire, collecting the wounded and rounding up prisoners of war. Latterly, they manned traffic and information posts, often in isolated locations, to direct vehicles and foot soldiers to their forward objectives. Not glamorous tasks, but dangerous and vital. 47 MPs were killed during the Normandy campaign.

6 Airborne Division was withdrawn to UK after 3 months to regroup and recruit. Despite this period of intense training, Rupert was given leave to marry Winifred Dyer in Salisbury on 7 December 1944.

Rupert's next action was Operation Varsity, which involved 16,000 paratroopers and was the largest airborne operation in history to take place on a single day in one location. The aim was to help surface assault troops to secure a foothold across the River Rhine by landing 2 airborne divisions on the eastern bank of the Rhine near Hamminkeln and Wesel, in Germany. Their orders were to capture the villages of Schnappenberg and Hamminkeln, clear part of the Diersfordter Forest and secure 3 bridges over the River Issel. Rupert and 8 other Military Policemen jumped into action with 5 Para Bde (6 Airborne Div) in broad daylight during the early morning of 24 March 1945.

According to the war diary, after landing in the drop zone in an area north of Wesel, the paratroopers were met with intense gun, shell and mortar fire from German troops. Sadly, Rupert was killed during the ensuing battle. He was only 23 years old. Whilst the operation was a success, by the end of the day, 6 Airborne Division alone had suffered around 1,400 killed, wounded or missing.

Rupert Newall was initially given a field burial at Hamminkeln, but was re-interred with a military funeral service on 12 November 1946, along with many other soldiers of 6 Airborne Division, at Reichswald Forest War Cemetery, Germany.



On Sunday 8 April 1945, the congregation at Meadowbank Methodist Church stood in tribute to their former friend and church member. Unfortunately, Rupert never got to see his son John who was born in September of that same year.
