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
# **Our cover photo**

It's the season of Lent, and thoughts turn towards the cross on which Jesus Christ died on that first Good Friday. Our photo shows the processional cross at St Mary's, often seen being carried by a member of the choir when choir and clergy are led in procession at the beginning and end of our services.

The symbols etched on the front reflect the church's dedication to St Mary. For example, the crowned M in the centre represents Mary as the Queen of Heaven and below that, the heart, pierced with seven daggers, represents "Our Lady of Sorrows", referring to the sufferings endured by the Virgin Mary as Mother of Jesus.

The inscription on the reverse side of the cross tells us that it was presented to St Mary's in memory of Joseph Goulding (1900 – 1943) and his wife, Florence Alice Goulding (1898 – 1970). The census shows Joseph growing up in Meadowbank. He and Florence, from Nantwich, married in 1922. In the 1939 England and Wales Register, they are shown living in School Road, Meadowbank, where Joseph worked at the Salt Mine. They both now lie at rest in our churchyard.

#### March thoughts from the Vicar ....

We come to March and a time of many preparations. As a beekeeper it is a busy month, and often a fraught one. If the weather is mild the bees will be busy and if there is rapeseed planted nearby they will find it. Rapeseed honey sets as hard as iron in the comb so if you don't spot it then you're in trouble. The trick is to get it out before it sets hard. It forms a solid white honey with a delicate flavour. I like to gently warm and stir it as it then stays soft enough to spread without breaking the knife.



On the other hand if March is cold the bees will starve. They will have long since worked through their winter stores so cold weather now is deadly for them. You can lose more bees in the spring than all through the winter.

March also bring us to Lent, a time of preparation and reflection. We journey with Christ into the wilderness. Maybe we won't actually spend 40 days in the desert, but we can make some wilderness space in our daily lives. Set aside some time to be still. Practice doing nothing. Hear the inrush of thoughts, pressures, things undone, distractions, needs, interruptions, and recognise these temptations. Time in stillness before God isn't easy. We need practice.

Our Lent series on Wednesday evenings is on the difficult words of Jesus. Perhaps we need to be reminded that the name 'Israel' means one who wrestles with God.


March is also a time for preparing for our Annual Parochial Meetings. (At St Mary's, our APCM is on 23<sup>rd</sup> April.) Ed. These aren't everyone's most exciting event but without them, and the people who offer themselves to serve on our behalf, we couldn't have our churches. Thank God for those who bring their time and talents into the work set before us. We need Churchwardens, Treasurers, PCC Secretaries (at St Mary's Linda is stepping down after many years of service), PCC members, Deanery Synod Representatives, Sidespeople, Standing Committee Members. These are the people who make the local church possible. We are thankful for those who have served us over the past year.

Please give careful and prayerful consideration to how you can be part of making our local church happen. It is often said that the church is the

people rather than the building. This is true, and just as our church buildings are built of different shapes and sizes of stone, all resting one upon another, linking to form a strength that endures the years, so also we need people who can bring different skills into God's work in these parishes.

I recently took part in an event at Chester Cathedral for the College of Canons. During it, we were given a little book *Sounding the Seasons – seventy sonnets for the Christian Year* by Malcolm Guite. One caught my eye for this time of year:

And blessed are the ones we overlook; The faithful servers on the coffee rota, They who hold no candle, bell or book But keep the books and tally up the quota, The gentle souls who come 'to do the flowers', The quiet ones who organise the fête, Church sitters who give up their weekday hours, Doorkeepers who open heaven's gate. Invisible on earth, without a voice, In heaven their angels glory and rejoice.

#### Whitehead Fields Burial Ground

This, newest section of St Mary's graveyard is maintained by volunteers who mow it regularly in the summer months. Others arrive on Working Party days to clear paths, trim edges and pull up the ragwort that flourishes in the surrounding area. Countryside Ranger, Chris Moseley and his group laid the hedge along one side just before Christmas and Peter Baldini keeps the other, older hedges in trim for us.

Now, some funds have been made available by a kind donor, enabling us to plan a planting programme to embellish the burial ground and the surrounding area, and to make it fruitful. People from the Churchyard & Fabric Committee, the Church Wood Conservation Group, keen gardeners and landscapers and Year 6 and their teacher, Mr Thomas, from Whitegate School, are all sharing their skills and time in making the project a reality.

The project is very much in its research phase as the children and gardeners look into varieties of shrubs, trees and bulbs to enhance the space and encourage the bees, but keep it manageable. Research and preparation done now will ensure they are ready to source the plants and get them in the ground in the autumn.

Our troubles in mid-Cheshire are pretty minimal in contrast with those of the people in Ukraine facing the Russian onslaught, or those suffering in Turkey and Syria following the recent massive earthquake.

But, like them, we are unsure what the future holds, and so easily find ourselves afraid. We need to ask if our belief is stronger than our fear. God reaches out to us - but we must be brave enough to respond. Life without fear is not possible, but our faith calls us to follow God's will for our life instead of reducing our lives because of our fears and insecurities. Lent is a time to ask the deep questions of our faith. Will we repeat the fears of the past, or trust a new ending to God?


#### **Stories from the Churchyard**

This month, Martin Allen brings us some personal memories of a very good friend....

#### George Billington (1929-2018)

George Billington was a longstanding, friendly and popular member of St Mary's Church, Whitegate, who involved himself in virtually all church activities.

Having been a church warden in both Tarporley and Nantwich, he was extremely knowledgeable in the administration of the church and also had a passionate interest in the workings of the salt mine. Indeed, on a church visit to the salt mine, it was evident that he knew more about the subject than our tour guide. In the past, George had taught carpentry and he frequently put his skills to good use repairing and refurbishing items within the church and Mews. An example of his work is the wooden cross in the latter build-



ing. In 2011, realising I was new to the church, he became my mentor as I took on various tasks, including church warden and school governor, always providing me with good advice and constructive criticism when required.

As George had carried out such a variety of church duties, I was glad to draw on his knowledge and experience. What's more, since we had both served in the army, my friendship with George had an extra dimension. (Once a soldier, always a soldier; on one occasion he told me off for slouching in the communion queue). I was particularly in awe of his bible reading ability in Always articulate and expressive he had the enviable ability to church. engage fully with the congregation. On one occasion some years ago, I had a particularly difficult passage to read with many lengthy biblical names and tongue twisters. Having rehearsed it many times, I managed to complete it without perceiving any problems. On receiving a few approving nods whilst I returned to my seat just in front of George and Evelyn, I was feeling relieved and pretty pleased with myself. But then there was a tap on my shoulder and George whispered in my ear, "You made a right mess of that lad". Now George had many talents, but whispering was not one of them! As his voice reverberated around the church, I was suddenly conscious of numerous eyes glaring at me. As I shrank into the seat in embarrassment, even my wife seemed to distance herself from me along the pew. On leaving the church, those who had hitherto nodded approvingly, were now rolling their eyes or offering me sympathetic smiles. Over coffee in the Mews, I asked George what

I had done wrong. "Nothing at all lad", he replied with a wicked grin, "Why do you ask?"

Some months later, in preparation for the May Fair, I joined a cleaning party in the churchyard. Not wishing to get my hands dirty, I decided to take on a supervisory role and thus set off to provide Alan Newton and Tony Buckley with some unwanted advice on how to spray weeds. At this time, despite his advancing years, George Billington was on his hands and knees scraping decades of moss from an almost completely concealed ledger memorial, which is a large rectangular stone slab lying flat on the surface of the soil. As I passed him, he shouted "Look at this, the inscription looks like new under all this moss". Looking over his shoulder, I saw that he had revealed the word GEORGE. I watched with interest as he worked on the surname. Firstly, he uncovered a B, then an I, by which time his face was becoming ashen. By the time he had uncovered the name BILLINGTON, he was visibly shaken. Discussing his namesake, we both recalled an old black and white horror film when a man foresaw the future date of his demise on a gravestone. Thankfully, George saw the funny side when he found that his namesake had died during the 1800s.

In addition to George's namesake, whose grave now appears to have been reclaimed by nature, there are a number of visible Billington ledger graves in the churchyard. On his behalf, I researched George's family history and found that they are all distant ancestors of his. Much to his delight, I discovered that during Victorian times, his family ran the Fox and Barrel public house near Cotebrook, and that George Billington was a blacksmith who I believe was buried at Whitegate in 1875. The building in which his smithy was located, now dilapidated, and probably being used as a barn, can still be seen from the A54 at Cornhill Farm at the far end of Clay Lane.

Such was George's popularity, the church was packed to the rafters at his funeral in 2018. Evelyn subsequently donated a bench seat in his memory, located near the church porch. George, a character and a gentleman, will always be missed.

The Parish Council has been informed that the application by United Utilities to install a Wastewater Treatment Plant on land just off

Whitegate Road has been withdrawn. Residents of Whitegate and Marton had joined W&MPC in submitting objections to the site proposed, raising concerns about the inappropriate use of open countryside, the backup plan to allow overflow into Bogart Brook in case of pump failure, and certain shortcomings in the technical specification. It is believed that United Utilities will appoint a new contractor to reassess the proposals.
