August thoughts from Rev Margaret

"What is this life if, full of care, We have no time to stand and stare. No time to stand beneath the boughs And stare as long as sheep or cows. No time to see, when woods we pass, Where squirrels hide their nuts in grass. No time to see, in broad daylight, Streams full of stars, like skies at night. No time to turn at Beauty's glance, And watch her feet, how they can dance. No time to wait till her mouth can Enrich that smile her eyes began. A poor life this if, full of care, We have no time to stand and stare."



Many of us will have heard this poem, "Leisure", by William Henry Davies. Published in 1911, at the end of the industrial revolution, the poet probably dreamt of a time when technology would allow us to slow down and have more time for leisure, or simply reflect.

Technology has moved on, far more than Davies could possibly have imagined. Yet it has achieved the opposite; we seem to have far less time. We may stop and stare – at the television, a mobile phone, a tablet or laptop. Young families' lives are crammed to bursting with sporting activity, groups or clubs, with no time to be at peace, to just stand and stare.

As most of you reading this will know, along with twelve others, I had the most humbling and joyful experience of being ordained Priest on 15th June. The three days before were spent at Foxhill on preordination retreat. Apart from worship, we spent the time in silence. I read the Archbishop of York's book, "On Priesthood", I prayed a lot, walked the grounds and worked on my poppy tapestry while I reflected on the nature of my calling. It was such precious time. I noticed far more the beauty around me, the birds singing, the squirrels playing, the bees in the lavender, the clover in the grass, carefully placed in creation like each stitch of my tapestry. Even food tasted different! I knew I was held and felt such an amazing sense of peace.



Jesus told his disciples, "Therefore I tell you, do not worry about your life, what you will eat or what you will drink, or about your body, what you will wear... Look at the birds of the air: they neither sow nor reap nor gather into barns, and yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not of more value than they? ... And why do you worry about clothing? Consider the lilies of the field, how they grow; they neither toil nor spin, yet I tell you, even Solomon in all his glory was not clothed like one of these. But if God so clothes the grass of the field, which is alive today and tomorrow is thrown into the oven, will he not much more clothe you?" (Matthew 6:25-30)

Jesus was encouraging his disciples to stop rushing about and worrying, to just stand and stare. It's good advice for us too. We only need to stand and stare at the beauty of creation around us, at every careful detail to know that God loves us and will provide for us – including the gift of Sabbath.

Keeping the Sabbath holy is one of the Ten Commandments. Too often, it is seen as something restrictive, yet this wonderful gift frees us to spend time with family, with God and his creation. For those who must work on a Sunday, it could be another day of the week. At the end of creation, God took a day off to delight in the fruits of his labour and so should we! It is part of the cycle – to rest (rooted in trust and gratitude) and enjoy and then we are energised to do God's work. When we neglect the Sabbath, we are refusing to accept the precious gift God gives us because he loves us. We are saying that we know better than God, that we can do everything without his help and don't want to spend time developing our relationship with God. Spending that quiet time with God enables us to listen to what God is saying and bringing into being in us. Jesus often went off to "a certain place" to pray, reflect and stop and stare. As we grow as disciples, we need to do the same.

So, this August, take every opportunity to just stop and stare, to hear what God is saying to you and to enjoy the stunning countryside around us. God bless,
