November brings the season of Remembrance. At our All Souls service, we think of our loved ones who have died, and at commemorative services on and around Armistice Day on $11^{\rm th}$ November, we give thanks for the service of all those killed whilst fighting for our country in wartime.

Our cover portrait is of Sir Muirhead Bone, a man who did a great deal to ensure that we do not forget those who fought in World Wars 1 & 2.

Bone was an official war artist in World War 1 and for a short time also in World War 2. Born in Glasgow in 1876, he died in Oxford in 1953 and was buried here in Whitegate churchyard. The story of his life and of how he came to lie at rest at St Mary's has been researched by Martin Allen. It's a fascinating account. November thoughts from the Vicar

Warning – the following letter contains difficult facts and may upset readers of a nervous disposition.

In Matthew chapter 5 we find what is often referred to as the Sermon on the Mount. In reality it is probably a gathering together of things Jesus said on a variety of occasions rather than a record of a single event. These



were clearly significant teachings that were recognised as central to how Jesus thought and taught. Near the end of the 'sermon' Jesus said, "Blessed are you when men (and I suspect women as well but they were a bit less inclusive in those days) revile you and persecute you and utter all kinds of evil against you..... Rejoice and be glad, for your reward is great in heaven, for so men (and ladies) persecuted the prophets who were before you."

Anyone who takes on a role of leadership within the church needs to heed those words. Because if you never make people cross then you're probably not doing your job.

So, sisters and brothers, I may need to make you cross.

Another of Our Lord's sayings is that to those who have more will be given, and from those who have not even what they have will be taken from them. When he said this Jesus wasn't thinking about how churches are run. He wasn't saying that someone with one job should be given more. Yet we seem to be in an age when those who already have jobs get landed with doing all the other tasks no-one else wants to do. This is not good.

Firstly, we are overwhelming those who are already carrying significant burdens.

Secondly, we create an atmosphere where people see that anyone who offers to take on a job is then landed with all the other jobs nobody wants to do. This results in fewer and fewer people doing more and more. I believe the church should be different.

Jesus also said, "Come to me all who labour and are heavy laden and I will give you rest.... For my yoke is easy and my burden is light." (Also from St Matthew, chapter 11 verses 28 & 29) I fear our churches are not living according to that teaching.

Nelson famously sent a message to the British fleet before the Battle of Trafalgar – "England expects every man to do his duty." (He omitted to recognise that many of the ships would also have women on board, from which we get the phrase, "Son of a Gun", but that's something for another occasion. Ask me over coffee one day.)

Nelson knew that a sailing ship could only function as an effective unit if every single member of the crew did what was needed at just the right time. It didn't matter how brilliant the captain was, or how skilled the gunner, if the yardarm jacks didn't trim the sails or the powder boys didn't keep the cannons supplied then the whole ship was useless.

I remember the First Officer of a nuclear submarine saying that it took every single member of the crew doing their bit at just the right time in order for a missile to be launched. Apparently that even included the chap whose job it was to make sure all the toilet seats were down. (I jest not.) If it had ever come to a real launch of a live nuclear missile he very much doubted it would have happened. Someone would have doubted the wisdom of starting a nuclear war. It would only take one person to not do a single task and the launch would fail.

Churches are fortunately not in the business of firing cannons (though I have witnessed the firing of a canon) but Nelson's signal holds good all the same. We need a lot of people all doing their bit for a church to exist.

In both our parishes people have stepped down from tasks they have done well and loyally for many years. We rejoice in their commitment and thank them for it. These are often what we call 'engine room jobs'. Unseen and unsung but essential to the life of our church community.

All jobs are important. Some are essential. There are certain tasks which are legal requirements. For example, as I have said on many occasions, you can have a parish without a church, you can have a parish without a vicar, but you can't have a parish without churchwardens. Churchwardens are the bishop's officers and without them a parish is not a legal entity.

There are other roles which are essential for reasons of management and compliance. Most notably a treasurer and a safeguarding officer. If a parish doesn't have a treasurer and can't handle its financial commitments then it cannot function. Both our treasurers have recently indicated they will be relinquishing their roles.

Over the past few years we have experienced a sharp decline in the number of people willing to take on important and essential tasks. I hear the same in many places, not just churches. Both during and after the Covid pandemic a significant number of people stepped down from jobs. In the main those tasks have been absorbed by people already carrying existing responsibilities. We have a situation where fewer and fewer people are being asked to do more and more. This isn't healthy and it isn't sustainable. It is a nettle we need to grasp.

There is no magic wand that will find new people to take on these tasks so I have to risk making you cross and say that we have a responsibility not to overburden those who are already serving faithfully and loyally.

We must protect them and value what they are doing. When I see a parish where the same name appears next to several jobs I know that is a parish heading for closure.

For that reason I want to make it clear that we will not run our churches by overloading a few. One of the signs of a healthy church is that is does a few things and does them well. An unhealthy church tries to keep everything going by overwhelming those who show willing. I am committed to allowing things to stop if nobody wants to do what is needed to keep them going.

This is not an arm-twisting exercise. If something has come to an end then it has come to an end. We will not try to make everything carry on just for the sake of it. Maybe we need to look at how trees shed their leaves heading into winter. There is a season to let things go.

I often find that people get grumpy when something stops. They ask why someone doesn't do it. This often results in a heroic few trying to keep people happy by keeping everything going. That never works.

To be sure this is not an easy process. Letting go of things is always hard. But we cannot continue to ask fewer and fewer people to do more and more. If roles become vacant we will advertise them. If someone feels able to take them on that is great and we will support them. If no-one feels able to take them on they will stop.

This might make some people cross but we will value those who offer their time and skills and energy and we will not abuse their generosity.


