July thoughts from the Vicar

There is a saying in Proverbs 29:18, "Where there is no vision, the people perish."

Over the past several months the Diocese of Chester has been consulting widely about what our vision should be. There have been '*Vision Cafés'* held in various places. The last, but no means least, was held at St Peter's in March.

The multitude of voices has since then been simmered down to four key themes. These were announced at a series of events held across the Diocese at the end of May. This is our first magazine and newsletter since the launch of the Diocesan Vision so I thought we could take a glance at where we are going.

The first vision is growing braver, fuller faith. Which is easy to say. But I wonder if it's as easy to do?

Let's take it back to front. Faith – what do we mean by faith?

What we don't mean is being always certain. St Paul tells us that faith is the substance of things hoped for. We live in a difficult and confusing world. Certainty would be nice, knowing things for sure would be more comfortable, but we know that's not how the world works. Faith is difficult, sometimes almost impossible.

I am always reminded that faith isn't about always seeing clearly. It is about brief glimpses that we have to hold onto. My favourite story of faith is Dick Evans, the Welsh lifeboat skipper, steering a stricken vessel home through a storm in unfamiliar waters. It was during the war when lighthouses showed a light only once every ten minutes. He said that you had to glimpse the light, then steer a course through the darkness holding onto that brief moment of light.

Fuller? Being fuller has many meanings but in this context my mind goes to holding things within. A barn is fuller when the harvest is gathered. There is a sense of bringing together, gathering, holding safe. To me that means a community of faith which embraces more people. An intentional commitment to make space for those who are outside. A drawing together of differences.

So we need to be braver. Because going outside of our usual habits, our normal tendencies, can be tricky. I was watching a YouTube channel giving tuition to motorcyclists about leaning a bike into corners. Many riders get scared when a bike leans into a corner, yet the laws of physics means it is the lean that enables a bike to corner safely. He began with an important point. "I can't take away the fear of leaning. You need that fear to stay safe; if there is gravel or oil in the bend you need to be cautious. What we're doing is training ourselves to be comfortable with the fear so it helps us rather than stops us."

Braver doesn't mean making life easier, it means accepting life is complex and difficult, but not letting the complexity and difficulty prevent you from tackling what needs to be tackled.

So yes, a faith which is fuller and braver, sounds good to me. But what about growing? Growing means starting from where we are and accepting that where we want to go is gradual and may be slow. We're not looking for instant results. Vision needs patience, it needs to be nourished, it needs to be deeply rooted.

So there's our first vision. Growing braver, fuller faith.

What about the other three? Next time dear friends, next time. I have some corners to practise. I convene a group of Christian motorcyclists called *The Sons of Jehu* (from 2 Kings 9:20) of which Bishop Mark is an occasional member. On 14th July we have a ride round the boundaries of the diocese, fortified no doubt by bacon butties and tea.
