

A verse for DECEMBER

Romans Ch 5:verse 5

Hope does not put us to shame because God's love has been poured out into I our hearts.

As we approach Christmas we are in the season of Advent and the world seems to be a particularly troubled place politically, economically and in terms of armed conflict. Next year will be different - but will it be any better?

We hope it will - but do we expect it to be? That depends on what we understand by the word hope. The commercialisation of Christmas has raised our hopes for the gifts we may receive - but that hope depends on someone actually giving us that present.

As Christians we look forward to God's Gift to us. The birth of Jesus is something I that has already happened, but part of that gift is the promise of what is still yet I to come - Christ's second coming. As God has already sent Jesus and raised him I from the dead we know that God will keep his promise. Our hope is therefore in I the full assurance of the resurrection of God's people and the coming of God's I Kingdom.

Until the 6th century there was little connection between Advent and Christmas.
The "coming" they had in mind was this second coming as the judge of the world.
The Advent season was not explicitly linked to Christ's first coming at Christmas until the Middle Ages.

May we share the hope that God has poured into our hearts with those we meet in the weeks and months to come.



December thoughts from the Vicar ...

But first....Advent

As we approach Christmas we look forward to carols, Christmas trees, family gatherings, good food, and a season of goodwill in the midst of dark and troubled world. It is a natural tendency to want the good things to come quickly. But first comes Advent. Preparation matters.



Do you look out for houses that put their Christmas lights up in November? This year the first one I spotted was in October. I am not entirely surprised. When we cannot wait for signs of good news it says we are living in a world of anxiety and fear. That God comes to us in weakness and vulnerability, in humility and grace, above all in deep passionate love, this is all the hope we need. It is transforming hope. If those who nurse ancient hurts and wage war could glimpse God's weakness we might take the first step towards a better world.

This reminds me why Advent is important. We need to learn patience. We need to stick with the darkness and gloom and acknowledge its reality. We need to prepare ourselves to encounter afresh the alternate world this child reveals to us.

Advent is a time for pausing and reflecting. We're not always terribly good at doing this when so much needs to be done at a busy time of year. But if we forget Advent then we lose Christmas. And many people do.

And then.....Christmas

As I write in late October, the weather is mild, and the leaves are falling. I suspect by the time you read these words the trees will be bare and the weather much colder. But also, as I am writing the news is filled with the suffering caused by wars. I suspect by the time you read these words that will not have changed. If anything, I fear things may have got worse. How shall we sing carols about peace on earth, a silent night, that little town of Bethlehem where God's greatest gift comes in stillness?

There is not a lot you and I can do to make a difference to the conflicts of our world. We can pray of course, prayer matters. When prayer ceases the world becomes a crueller place. In prayer we encounter a different reality and discover the things we can do. Prayer changes us; a person who prays earnestly notices different things about people and situations, and themselves. Their life connects with people in a way that reflects what they have glimpsed in prayer. These are moments when God's touch becomes reality. I remember a bishop who was asked how his prayer life was going. He paused for a moment and then said, "Boringly faithful." What he meant was that he made a commitment to pray daily. He set time aside and made space in his day. He did this day by day, week by week, year upon year. He did it when he didn't feel like doing it. He did it when he felt no-one was listening. He just doggedly stuck at it.

What I noticed about him was that amongst the many things he did which wound people up there was one characteristic which everyone valued. If you had a problem, if life had gone wrong, he always had time, and he never jumped to conclusions. People knew he was someone they could turn to in time of trouble. That capacity was honed through his daily encounter with God in prayer. He was alert to an alternative reality, and ready to seek it in those he encountered.

In Christmas God enters our world in vulnerability and humility. This baby doesn't provide solutions and answers. In the midst of so much violence and suffering we need those moments of stillness and silence, not because we can fix our world, but because we can allow God to fix us. And people who have met with God have a tendency to make life better. Through them people sense something better is close.

One of my favourite Christmas prayers is what happens when it is all over:

When the song of the angels is stilled when the star in the sky is gone when the kings and princes are home when the shepherds are back with their flocks the work of Christmas begins: to find the lost to heal the broken to feed the hungry to release the prisoner to rebuild the nations to bring peace among the people to make music in the heart.

I will make this opportunity to thank those who over the coming weeks will bring their time, skills and energy into making our church ready for the celebration of Our (otherwise Lord's Nativity known as Christmas (as the BCP says). As a teacher and language examiner she was passionate about education and some people locally may still remember being taught French by her at Verdin Grammar School.

Gill's funeral is to take place at St Mary's Church, Whitegate at 10am on Saturday 7th December.

□ Christmas wishes from all at St Mary's

Cards will be delivered to as many homes in the parish as our kind volunteers can manage and they will also be available in church and in the porch, in The Plough and at the Station Café. The cards bear our Christmas wishes on the front and on the reverse, a calendar of

services and activities taking place in December. Look out for the cards and keep yours for handy reference throughout the month.

□ Save your stamps for the RNIB

The Mission and Giving group is encouraging everyone to save stamps from mail arriving in December. Bring them to church in January and put them in the box on the table at the back. Pam and Mike Venables will collect them, pack them up and send them off.

The RNIB can make approximately £20 per kilo for

these stamps, using that money to fund their support for people with sight loss.

The key points to remember when you save your stamps:

- 1. Trim each one from the envelope with approx. 1cm around the stamp.
- 2. Separate British and Overseas stamps and save them in two envelopes.
- 3. Don't include the large gold pre-printed Post Office labels.
- 4. Bring your stamps to church by the end of January.

□ More Mission and Giving news

The Mission & Giving group (a sub-committee of St Mary's PCC), met recently to discuss and decide on the charity or charities we should donate to with our 3rd quarter funds this year. Having supported four local organisations in previous quarters (Pettypool Trust,

Cheshire Young Carers, Joshua Tree and the Cheshire Agricultural Chaplaincy), it was unanimously agreed that this quarter's donation of \pounds 625 should be sent to Christian Aid, to be used to help fund aid to one of the many war-torn regions in the world today.

By donating via Christian Aid, who work with partners on the ground in each location, we can be sure that the funds will be used effectively. Their new Christmas appeal focuses on supporting families fleeing conflict, helping them to buy food and life-giving supplies. It has the arresting heading: No room for comfort and joy ... when you've left everything behind to survive.
