Archdeacon of Macclesfield to become Bishop of Thetford



Downing Street announced in June 2023 that Ian Bishop, Archdeacon of Macclesfield since 2011 and formerly Vicar of Middlewich and our Rural Dean, is to be Bishop of Thetford in the Diocese of Norwich.

Speaking at the time of the announcement, Ian said: "The thing that will be hardest to leave is actually the people, who are colleagues, but who have become friends."

"I have never had anything other than wonderful support from the people of this diocese and I just want to say, 'thank you'."

The Bishop of Chester, Mark Tanner said, "Ian has been an outstanding Archdeacon: wise, patient, prayerful, and endlessly encouraging. I am delighted at his appointment to Thetford, although sorry to see him moving away from Chester."

Ian will be ordained as a bishop in Westminster Abbey on 29 September.

August thoughts from the Vicar

And so, dear reader, we pick up where we left off last month. But first I must ask you to pause and do something for me. Find whatever device you use to make contact with the internet and Google *The Devil's Gallop* by Charles Williams. I know the title is perhaps a little unusual for this

devout publication but bear with me.

Have you listened to it? If so, then no doubt your mind will be cast back to the Adventures of Dick Barton, Special Agent. If not, then lucky you for being so young.

It was a serial adventure broadcast over the wireless by the BBC Light Programme featuring gripping tales of daring deeds that saved the nation.

So, in our own more modest way, our serial continues. Last month I introduced the Diocese of Chester's vision, beginning with a commitment to growing a braver, fuller faith. We need more Dick Barton.

This month we'll take a glance at the second part of the vision, *Blessing 1.5 million lives, one life at a time*. There is a rudimentary bit of mathematics behind that intention. Our diocese is home to around 1.65 million people. I haven't counted them all myself so I'll take the bishop's word for it. About 150,000 of those have some connection with practising faith, leaving 1.5 million with no engagement with any kind of faith.

I'm assuming the bishop doesn't intend us to get in touch with all 1.5 million of them or else we'd be like the guy in Jaws – 'We're gonna need a bigger church." The intention is captured in the third and fourth parts of the vision.

- Transformative loving service (in practice) &
- Engaged locally, working together in loving generosity.

I think there's something good in that. It is a commitment to being the local church, something which many other dioceses have shied away from in these difficult times. Most large organizations facing difficult times tend to centralize and become very controlling. The Church of England has certainly suffered from that tendency over the past thirty years.

Our diocese has a long history of supporting the local church and maintaining the parish system. We still believe in providing a place of worship and Christian ministry in every community. The shape of that may change, how it is resourced may change, but the commitment remains firm. In aiming to bless 1.5 million lives we are reminding ourselves that we can only do it one life at a time. Most of us, most of the time, can only make small differences. We can only be there for a limited number of people. It is like the story of two people walking on a beach after a storm. The sand was littered with starfish washed up by the storm, stranded far from the water. It was a sad sight. One person picked up a starfish and carried it back to the water. Their friend was overwhelmed by the number of dying starfish. "Why bother? You can't make a difference."

"Well, it made a difference to that one," was the response.

Sometimes we just have to do what we can do. We must not allow the fact that we can't fix all the problems, stop us from fixing one problem.

The church is a serial adventure. Each generation faces different challenges. I have a suspicion what we do, day by day, week by week, won't ever be broadcast. But they are tales of courage and daring, and they make a difference that matters.

Just the act of listening to someone's concerns can be very helpful to that person. As they verbalize the problem they also think about the solutions for themselves and our part is to just listen in a non-judgmental way, loving the person as they work through the problem, just as God loves us in the midst of our own problems.

Whitegate Village Show

Preparations are already well underway for our annual Village Show taking place this year on Saturday 9th September.

It was originally an event for members of Whitegate Women's Institute (WI) and was held on a WI meeting night with classes in just produce (ie. preserves and baking), craft and flower arranging.

Twenty plus years ago it was moved to a Saturday and classes added for members' children. For example old favourites such as, 'a garden on a



plate', 'the biggest weed' and 'a vegetable animal'! Having it on a Saturday meant the children could come along and see their entries displayed and enjoy receiving the cup and medals if they'd won, and receive the sweets given to everyone for taking part. More sections for adults were added to make it a proper village show - with classes in photography, art and horticulture. There is now a class for everyone to enter, whether you bake, knit, sew, paint, draw, arrange flowers, create any craft, grow fruit and veg or take photos!

Still organised by Whitegate WI, this fun event for the whole community and surrounding area has grown into a popular annual activity, only stopping for a couple of years during the Covid pandemic.

Our first year back, last year, was as busy as ever with twice as many non-WI entrants as WI entrants. A pleasing half of the total number of entrants were first timers, which was great to see. There were 176 individual entries in total, 40 of those being in the produce class - that's a lot of jam, chutney, cake, bread and biscuits for the judge to taste!

Our judges are specialists in their area of expertise - some are WI trained and also judge at county shows, others are from specialist societies like our photography judge, this year from Winsford Camera Club. They are well aware that ours is a village show, so don't let it put you off entering - it's all very relaxed and good fun!

This year we have an extra, fun class - Blooming Boots & Flowery Footwear - you just need to plant-up a shoe, boot or welly etc. and the judging will be by public vote, with the most popular winning a prize. Voting entry monies will be donated to charity.

The Show is easy to enter - no prior application form is needed, you just bring your entries along on the morning and pay and display! (adults 50p a class/kids free).

Once judging has taken place the show opens to the public and you can visit to see how you've done and enjoy delicious WI home baked cakes and tea/coffee..... and perhaps take home a trophy!
