

There but not there. Passers-by will remember that this is the season when Tommy, our soldier figure, makes his appearance to stand guard on Church Green until after Christmas. His black, outlined shape means that he blends in with the background; it's excellent camouflage as he keeps watch. He's been with us since 2018 when we commemorated the end of World War I and as always, we'll be honouring those who died in that and other wars on the weekend of 11th/12th November with Acts of Remembrance at the Salt Mine in Meadowbank and at St Mary's.

Sadly, that "war to end all wars" has been followed by many more. Robert Palmer, killed in action in Mesopotamia (now, Iraq) wrote this poem, a plea from the heart, a prayer for peace, just months before he died. It is as apt today as it was then.

HOW LONG, O LORD?

How long, O Lord, how long, before the flood
Of crimson-welling carnage shall abate?
From sodden plains in West and East the blood
Of kindly men streams up in mists of hate,
Polluting Thy clean air: and nations great
In reputation of the arts that bind
The world with hopes of Heaven, sink to the state
Of brute barbarians, whose ferocious mind
Gloats o'er the bloody havoc of their kind,
Not knowing love or mercy. Lord, how long
Shall Satan in high places lead the blind
To battle for the passions of the strong?
Oh, touch Thy children's hearts, that they may know
Hate their most hateful, pride their deadliest foe.

A verse for November

1 Kings Ch 18: vs 11-12

Then the Lord said to Elijah, "Go, stand in front of me on the mountain. I, the Lord, will pass by you." Then a very strong wind blew. The wind caused the mountains to break apart. It broke large rocks in front of the Lord. But that wind was not the Lord. After that wind, there was an earthquake. But that earthquake was not the Lord. After the earthquake, there was a fire. But that fire was not the Lord. After the fire, there was a still small voice.

Elijah was running away. Elijah was afraid. Things were not going well for him.

Often we run away too. We avoid the deep and difficult things of life. We fill our lives with absolutely anything which can disguise our need for stillness and space. We avoid difficult interactions. We speak too much, too soon and too often, and this stops us from listening properly to those around us.

If we value silence, experiment with it, and eventually love it, we, like Elijah, begin to hear the whisper of God's still small voice of wisdom and peace, and we begin to be attentive to those we meet.

November thoughts from the Vicar...

November brings us to a time rich in meanings. It is a Season of Remembrance. We mark the time of All Souls when we give thanks for the lives of the faithful departed. We come to Remembrance Sunday and stand at our War Memorials to remember the fallen. This is a public duty and one that the Church of England does well.



I was talking recently with a Naval Chaplain who was telling me how he'd fared on a training course for naval padres. Part of the course was being thrown into deep cold water and hauling themselves into a boat. My friend had struggled, twice failing to get himself out of the water and into the boat. They only got three chances for a pass.

He recalled a grim looking Marine scowling down at him clearly unimpressed by his floundering. In a broad Scottish accent he was told in no uncertain terms; "You sir – you get your ******* posterior (or words to that effect) out of that ****** water and into this ***** boat."

It worked. Somehow he found himself sloshing about in the bottom of the boat. Battered, cold, wet, humiliated, but passing out successfully.

I asked him why he wanted to put himself through it all. His answer was quick. He valued the place a padre has in the Navy. In the Navy a chaplain holds the same rank as whoever they are speaking to. If you're talking to a stoker then you're a stoker. If you're speaking to an admiral then you're an admiral. And every rank in the Navy knows that the chaplain is there for them and what they can expect of them. The place of the padre as the representative of a different reality is valued.

On Remembrance Sunday the Church of England stands on the street in a public place and remembers those whose sacrifice kept our freedom. It is a sacred trust and a public trust. It is a time when people know what the Church is for and it is our duty and privilege to walk between two worlds.

When I was a newly ordained curate we had to attend training sessions at Liverpool Cathedral. A mad old canon told us that people come towards the church "sorrowing, sighing, bleeding, dying." He told us the Church's job was to give them a glimpse of heaven, and let them go back into the world with a glimmer of hope.

He may have been mad, indeed the bishop sacked him soon afterwards, but in that moment he imparted a priceless lesson. The Church is not here for the Church. The Church is a fragile and often failing institution which exists to stand on the street pointing towards glory. It is a sign, pointing beyond itself, towards a reality not of this world.

Of course most of the time most of the people are too busy to notice that towards which we point. So forgive me if I make my annual plea as we draw towards Advent. In a world that contains so much suffering and sadness we are quick to rush towards messages of joy. So Christmas trees go up in November and we want to sing carols as soon as it is December. But if we rush towards Christmas we forget about Advent. If we do so we miss something important.

We need a season of waiting, of watching, of making ready. This is of course difficult. Our instinct is usually to avoid the difficult things. Sometimes we need to hear the voice of an irate Scottish Marine, just because it's difficult doesn't mean we ought to give up.
