A verse for OCTOBER

Mark Ch 12: verses 14-15

Is it right to pay the Imperial tax to Caesar or not? Should we pay or shouldn't we?

If ever there is an obviously God-given resource then surely it is rain. But water can be a good or bad thing - good water falls on catchment areas, flows into reservoirs, gets treated and we end up paying for it to come out of our taps - or even in bottles in shops.

But there is also the water that falls everywhere else, waters our gardens and crops, helps the sale of umbrellas, ruins some people's holidays, swells our rivers, causes floods and brings even more temporary traffic lights onto our roads. This water is free at the point of delivery - even if there is a charge to remove the excess which may not be popular.

Jesus was asked - to whom should people pay their taxes? It was like us asking: to I whom we should pay our Water charges. Here we pay them to United Utilities who I also charge us for disposing of an equivalent volume of waste - but the water I companies have a very poor reputation for that.

In Jesus' time taxes were paid to the Romans, who were the unpopular occupying power, as well as to the Temple. Jesus' response was to ask for a coin. On one side was the head of Caesar and on the other a Latin inscription He asked his questioners: "Whose portrait is this?" and "Whose inscription?" to which they replied "Caesar's". Jesus replied, "Give to Caesar what is Caesar's and to God what is God's".

For us it is more complex. In both cases God and man are working together - even if we do not realise it . So we can happily thank God for our water, and pray for and pay those who treat and deliver it to us.

October thoughts from the Vicar

As we moved into the autumn summer seems to fade away. One of my enduring memories of summer 2024 was cycling around Norfolk. There were some wonderful discoveries. A colony of seals on a quiet section of beach well away from places where cars could get to. Woodforde's Brewery where they make Nelson's Revenge, a particularly wonderful pint (though they had actually run out of beer the day we went B). A couple



on a beautiful sailing boat up Horsey Windpump; they had spent years building it at home and were on their maiden voyage. And the many rural churches scattered across the landscape.

All of the churches were open which was a pleasant surprise. Just before Covid we were moving to keeping our churches open. This is something we haven't come back to largely because of reduced capacity since the pandemic. The Norfolk rural economy used to be very healthy which accounts for the large number of small (and some not so small) churches often situated miles from anywhere.

Most of the churches were only used for public worship once a month and sometimes less. Some were clearly loved and were kept in very good condition. There is something wonderful about a small simple church that people cherish and keep in good order. One of the things that always interests me is the stone step at the church door. We call the step at the door a threshold from the days when the threshed stalks from the harvest were scattered on the floors. There was a raised lip at the door to keep the stalks in place, hence the term 'threshold'.

It is the deep curve of a worn step that always intrigues me. It speaks of countless generations of people who have used that church and walked through the doorway. Each person, each step, leaves a mark. Imperceptible by any one individual but as a community over time their feet tell a story.

We are moving towards a season of remembrance. In November we hold our annual Remembrance Sunday services remembering those who gave their lives for the freedom we enjoy. How we hold those services changed over the pandemic. We are still rediscovering how best to meet the needs of the wider community in marking remembering the fallen.

It is also the time when we hold our All Souls service. At St Peter's it is on 3rd November, at St Mary's 10th November. Both at 6.30pm. We will read out the names of those who have died over the past year. We also invite people to include the names of family and friends. These are the company of saints whose lives leave impressions. Like the many feet whose passage is told in a worn stone threshold each life makes a difference.

If you have names you would like to be read, please let us know in good time. You can post or email them to me at the vicarage. Just make sure you do so before 19th October as I shall be away from the desk between then and the first All Souls service.
