The Vicar's letter for May

As you see from the May Diary, St Mary's Church will hold its Annual Parochial Church Meeting (APCM) on Sunday 11th at 11.00am; it will take place in The Mews straight after the 9.30am service of Holy Communion. It's an important event in the church's calendar and we urge all on the Electoral Roll to attend. At that meeting, we need to elect 2 Churchwardens (assuming we wish to open every Sunday). We also need to elect PCC members and Deanery Synod representatives.



In place of his monthly letter, Paul has asked that we print here the report that he will present to the APCM on that day.

Allow me to repeat an old joke about a vicar who needed to paint a church. They bought a large tin of paint, a paintbrush and a bottle of thinners. Halfway through the job it was clear that the tin of paint was going to run out so the vicar added some thinners to it and carried on painting. It soon became clear that even having thinned the paint it still wasn't going to be enough so they added more thinners. This continued with the vicar adding more and more thinners until the job was finally finished.

The vicar stood back to admire the work and saw that the church looked terrible. The first half was pretty good, but the sections painted with the increasingly thinned out paint looked dreadful.

They fell to their knees in prayer. "O Lord, this is a right mess. What should we do?"

And a voice spoke from the heavens, "Repaint, repaint, and thin no more."

Making things stretch too far is rarely, if ever, a good idea. I want to remind us of that story as we celebrate those who give of their time, skill, energy and dedication to God's work in our parishes. Those who carry out what has been described as "the thousand and one tasks of the Kingdom" are inspirational. Much of what they do goes on behind the scenes, unseen and often unsung. But without their commitment and tenacity and devotion (see below) our churches can't be what we want them to be.

I am reminded of something I read recently about how we describe what we come to church for. Some people call this activity 'churchgoing'. Some perceive a bit more and refer to it as 'worship'. I was reminded of the older term, seldom used these days, that when we come to church we do so for our 'devotions'. 'Devotions' is a very old-fashioned term but I want us to rethink its significance.

As a Canon of Chester Cathedral I spend one day each month as a duty chaplain. This is a wonderful experience which is best described as 'loitering with intent'. Just being there, being present in a sacred place, meeting people at random, has resulted in some incredible conversations and encounters.

Of the many people who wander into the Cathedral some are just 'going' as they would go to any significant public or historic building. Some do it out of habit, they are churchgoing. Perhaps they might even describe themselves as a 'churchgoer'.

Some come specifically to 'worship'. They enjoy the liturgy and music provided by the cathedral. They understand that the purpose of a cathedral, as with any church, is to be a place of worship. The daily prayers are said, the midday Holy Communion is celebrated, there is silence before and politeness afterwards.

And some come from 'devotion'. They sense a direct connection with God's presence which they cannot explain or describe. Their purpose in what they do is driven by devotion to God's love. Often those who most demonstrate a sense of devotion are not regular 'churchgoers'. They are quite often people who rarely step foot inside a church. But on this day, in this place, they sense an encounter with God which a personal experience.

Closer to home I sense that those who make our churches gateways to heaven are those who do what they do out of devotion. At this time of year, when we have to do the practical things that need to be done, let us recognize, cherish, and celebrate the devotion which upholds our life together. It is something beyond measure. "Devotion", it's a word we ought to use more often.

The past year has seen several of our most devoted people need to move away because they are also devoted to their families. This creates gaps in the thousand and one tasks of the Kingdom because there is much that needs to be done for a church to be open.

In some cases devoted people have taken on additional tasks which is kind and generous, but like the paint, stretching things thinly isn't a good idea. I want to encourage those who are holding our church together to not be like the vicar's tin of paint. Do not keep taking on more and more. Do not stretch yourself too thinly. It is not what God's calls us to be.

We, us, together, need to step back and see how things are. God has never wanted the church to stretch people to the point where what is done out of devotion becomes a burden too heavy to bear. Jesus told people to come to him because his burden was light and his yoke was easy.

The reality is that there is a burden; if we take on a task it needs to be done and done well. But it should not be too heavy. Jesus grew up in a carpenter's workshop yet he rarely spoke of things to do with woodwork. This has often puzzled me for I am also the son of a carpenter. I grew up knee deep in wood shavings. Why did Jesus speak more of agricultural images than those drawn from the skill of a craftsman?

So far as I can recall this reference to a yoke being easy is the only time he uses the carpenter's skills in his teaching. An 'easy yoke' is a well-fitting yoke. It takes a skilled craftsman to shape a yoke that fits well and enables the plough to be pulled without causing pain or injury to the valuable animal.

We need to shape the yoke God calls us to bear for his work to go forward. If we change, if the people doing tasks changes, then the shape of the task needs to change.

For example, we ask a lot of those who stand for election as PCC members. We are committed to enabling all our PCC members to undertake the Safeguarding training needed for the fulfilment of their duties. But not everyone is keen on online training resources so we will ensure we provide appropriate support and alternative ways of training.

Or, with two churches to open, and prepare, tidy up and secure, for services to take place we rely on at least two churchwardens in each parish. Maybe we could elect more and share the workload. Or maybe we could recruit a person or a team of people to do the things our churchwardens need to do. Or maybe we have fewer churchwardens and open our churches on alternate Sundays?

What we cannot do is simply carry on doing the same if people are not available. Doing that is like thinning the paint.

I have informed our PCCs of my intention to retire in 2026 so this year I hope we can work together to ensure we have confident, well-trained and well-resourced lay members to guide the parishes towards the next stage of God's work in this place. A key sign of a healthy church is a community that does a few things and does them well. The same holds true for ourselves.

My continuing thanks to my colleagues in our ministry team, our churchwardens, PCC members, those elected to various offices and those who behind the scenes look after our buildings, handle our administration, prepare music, offer hospitality, arrange flowers, care for our churchyards, ring bells, clean and polish, and ensure an endless supply of Jaffa cakes and Jammy Dodgers.

□ Easter Ride-out is a roaring success

Those who read last month about Bishop Mark's motorcycling event, will be pleased to learn that it more than achieved its objectives. The initiative drew a turnout of more than 40 bikers from a wide area – with one riding all the way from Edinburgh to take part. Setting out from Church House in Daresbury, they passed through Frodsham and Ellesmere Port, stopped for a soup and sandwich lunch at Bishop's House in Chester and finished with tea and cake at Foxhill.

The original aim was to raise £1,000 to buy and pay for upkeep of a 125cc motorbike – an essential vehicle offering transport for education, healthcare and midwifery workers in the Democratic Republic of Congo, where such services are often provided by the Congo Church. In the event, the initiative has so far raised more than £6,000 – and the total is still rising.
