I A verse for MARCH

Psalm 24: verse 1

I "The earth is the Lord's, and everything in it, the world and all who live in I it"

I The earth is the Lord's because he created it - but can you imagine what it would be like if he wanted to create it now? Just think of the process he'd have to go through - environmental impact statements, risk assessments and planning applications, public enquiries, appeals and hearings.

He'd be asked to submit a cost/benefit analysis. How would it be heated and lit - the idea of using a fireball in the sky sounds dodgy - but you could turn it off at night. What creatures would be allowed to inhabit the earth, the skies and the seas - how would they be chosen - and who'd be in charge of them? Where would they live? How long will it take - to which God replied, "six days".

The world God made then, and the world we live in now, seem very different places. Wildlife has evolved, human beings have migrated in huge numbers and for different reasons - a process well established in Old Testament times but still in our news headlines today. Many things are no longer as God wants them to be. The human race has to accept responsibility for much of this - and environmental and human rights matters are being challenged, so we need to be ever vigilant.

March thoughts from the Vicar...

Consider the hymn "Dear Lord and Father of mankind, forgive our foolish ways...." It is well known and much loved. But do we know the meaning behind it?

To begin with there is something odd about its author, John Greenleaf Whittier (1807-1892). Whittier was a member of the Society of Friends, otherwise known as Quakers. Quakers do not sing hymns during their services, they use very little by way of words preferring



to wait in silence for that 'still small voice'. (Even that is a misunderstanding. The original text doesn't refer to a still, small voice, it points us towards the 'piercing silence'. But that's another story.)

So why would a Quaker write a hymn?

Well, the short answer is that he didn't. Whittier had been reading a book about religious practices in the East, particularly the use of a plant that grew in northwest India. Vedic priests would take the *soma* plant and from it brew an intoxicating drug which they used during religious festivals. Having taken the drug they fell into an intoxicated frenzy which they believed had spiritual revelation.

At the time there were various Christian groups who favoured spiritual experiences as a sign of revival. Whittier mistrusted such goings on and wrote a poem saying that faith sprang from a much deeper encounter with God.

In its original form the verse before Dear Lord and Father of mankind read:

And yet the past comes round again, And new doth old fulfil; In sensual transports wild as vain We brew in many a Christian fane The heathen Soma still!

Faith is rooted not in *transports wild* but rather finds true expression *in deeper reverence*. The cut down version of the poem became the hymn we know today, within which we can see hints of Quaker worship. Phrases such as *simple trust, gracious calling,* and the disciples response to rise and follow Jesus *without a word*. And again, we hear echoes of a faith lived in the silence of worship, *Sabbath rest, calm of hills above, the silence of eternity interpreted by love*. Finally we come to the heart of the matter:

Breathe through the heats of our desire thy coolness and thy balm; let sense be dumb, let flesh retire; speak through the earthquake, wind and fire; O still small voice of calm! O still small voice of calm! When you have sung these words many times over the years, were you ever aware that they began not as a hymn but as a poem? Have you pondered the puzzle that they were written by a Quaker, yet they who don't sing hymns? Have you known that they refer to Vedic priests getting high on drugs?

Well, maybe you have. Or maybe you haven't. Hymns can be surprising. So, during Lent, I invite you to join us for a series of short reflections looking at some well-known, and maybe the odd not so well-known, hymns, and their authors.

We have as yet no idea how soon the work could be done, even once a decision is made, but at least in the meantime, the clock itself continues to keep very good time and is wound twice a week by our two winders, Deryck Petty and Keith Miller.

It is a licensed café, established in 2013 as part of the Barrowmore Limited charity, which supports vulnerable adults. The staff are friendly and delivered a lovely experience in a delightful setting.


