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## **Our cover photo**

This month we feature the Advent wreath, which at this time of year always stands by the pulpit at St Mary's. The circular wreath is a reminder of God's endless love and the coloured candles help us to remember those who foretold the coming of Christ Jesus. On the first Sunday of Advent, this year 3<sup>rd</sup> December, one of the purple candles is lit during the service and each subsequent week a further candle is ignited, leaving just the white one, to be lit on Christmas Eve. It is a Lutheran tradition which has spread throughout many other Christian denominations. Like an Advent calendar, the wreath and the lighting of the candles help to mark the days of the Advent season, a period of reflection, of waiting and of expectation.

#### **Colours of Christmas**

Our next exhibition of photos in The Mews is called 'Colours of Christmas'. It features images of Christmas and winter scenes by a number of different photographers from within our congregation. The exhibition will be there for all to view whenever The Mews is open, throughout Advent and the Christmas season, from 26 November until 4 February. If you are able to call in to the Festive First Thursday Café on 7<sup>th</sup> December, there'll be coffee, mince pies and carols too.

### A verse for December

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#### Matthew Ch 24: verses 43-44

Remember this: If the owner of the house knew what time of night a thief was coming, the owner would watch and not let the thief break in. So you also must be **ready**, because the Son of Man will come at a time you don't expect him.

In 2023, we travel through what are known as the 'end times', that is the time between Jesus' first coming as a baby in the stable some 2000 years ago, and his second coming at some point in the future. In our verse from Matthew's gospel, Jesus reminds us that we have no idea when this will be but tells us that he will come "at a time [we] don't expect him".

In the light of the important truth that Jesus will come again, but that we do not know when it will be, each year, we take time during the 4 weeks of Advent to reflect on how we should be living our lives as we wait, and on what Jesus means when he tells us to be "ready"?

Firstly, being ready means that we should keep focused on the things of God and not be distracted, by the excitements or the problems of our day to day lives. We need to keep coming to church, reading our Bibles, praying and living the Christian life. Ironically this can be more difficult at Christmas than at other times because there is so much else going on.

And secondly it means that we should tell others about Jesus. Christmas can be a good time, with many more people than usual coming to church. But Christmas can also be a bad time, because for most people it is becoming merely a midwinter festival of light - a chance to cheer ourselves up in these gloomy dark cold days. Make sure that you keep reminding people that this is a Christian festival.

What might you do to be "ready" this Advent?

## December thoughts from the Assistant Curate...

December can be a strange time. Amid the cries of "I just don't know where the year has gone!" the month flies by in a flurry of activities, and what is referred to as "the holiday season" turns out for many to be the most stressful time of the year. Some people are bursting with excitement, with Christmas trees, lights and celebrations



before the month has even begun. In contrast, there are those who are completely overwhelmed by the season, frantic with the pressure to create perfect celebrations. We should also spare a thought for those who struggle with cold, damp winter days and longer, darker winter nights, those who find it hard being on their own, or with unhappy memories of Christmas.

In our house, our trees go up every year on 1st December. My youngest son, Tom, counts the sleeps until the trees go up (the posh one in the living room, and the colourful, "anything goes" one on the landing), the Advent boxes go out and we set up the Nativity scene. The Christmas books, CDs and DVDs are brought back out. We write our Christmas cards, worry about what we're giving to Aunty Margaret for Christmas, and buy enough food to feed an army, even though the shops are only closed for one day!

Before we get caught up in all things Christmassy, the church colours change to purple for Advent. Advent comes from the Latin, "Adventus", which means "coming". All too often, we want to race to Christmas, but Advent is an important time of waiting; to pause, take a breath, and think about what we are preparing for. We live in the "now and not yet", where Jesus has already lived as one of us, but we await his return. When someone visits, we anticipate it. Just before Auntie Mary arrives, there is a flurry of activity – hoovering, dusting, clearing away the toys and other clutter, preparing delicious food... preparing for something is not just thinking about it, but taking action.

In this season of Advent, I often find it helpful to prepare by reflecting on Holman Hunt's painting, "The Light of the World". In it, Jesus is standing at a door, holding a lamp, which shines as dawn approaches. There is no handle on the door, and the rusty nails and hinges overgrown with ivy and weeds show that the door has never been opened – the door can only be opened from the inside. The door is, of course, the door to our hearts. In Advent, we pause to do a little maintenance to our doors, to oil the hinges and to clear the weeds – all those distractions in this world that get in the way of us opening the door and letting Jesus in. The writing under the picture is taken from Revelation 3:



"Behold! I stand at the door and knock. If anyone hears my voice and opens the door, I will come in and eat with that person, and they with me."

Jesus is standing there, knocking, wanting desperately to fully be a part of our lives, but we must open the door from the inside. How much time do we take, to slow down, or stop and listen, to know that he is there? The dawn of the picture is the new day, a symbol of new life with Christ. In the picture, we see Jesus wearing a crown of thorns. It is a stark reminder of all he went through to offer us that new life. To really connect with, and be changed by Christmas, we must not limit ourselves to the sanitised version of the nativity we see on Christmas cards.

The harsh reality was a birth in a dirty, draughty stable on a cold night because every other door was firmly closed. With the cradle must come the cross. If we never look beyond the image of Jesus as an infant – to his life, ministry, death, and resurrection to deal with our sinful mess and bring us back to God, we miss the whole point of Christmas and of God's unending love for humanity.

There are plenty of services at St Mary's and at St Peter's this Advent and Christmas to help us pause, take a breath, prepare, and then celebrate. We'd love for you and your loved ones to join us!

Wishing you all a wonderful Christmas full of love, joy, and peace.

## RNIB Stamp appeal

- 1. Leave approx. 1cm (half an inch) around the stamp when trimming from the envelope.

- 3. The gold-coloured stamp labels printed at the Post Office are of no value, thank you
