For the Fallen, by Laurence Binyon

I "They shall grow not old as we that are left grow old; age shall not weary I them nor the years condemn. At the going down of the sun and in the morning I we will remember them."

November is a month to remember, to remember all those who gave their lives for us in wars close to home and far away. Sadly wars continue and people continue to die, not just combatants but civilians, even children. They too should be remembered.

The other emotional message at our cenotaph at remembrance is "When you get |
 home tell them of us and say, for your tomorrows we gave our today."

That is so true in so many situations known to us, but often the result of war has not always meant a bright and free future for those left behind. Now, more than ever, it is important that we keep that message alive as with each passing year there are fewer and fewer left with first hand memories of the two great wars that directly affected us in this country. It may seem that our current situation and immediate future is not as bright as we would like, but when we look at others in our world we should remain grateful for the life we have.

But November is not only a time we remember wars and their effects, on the very I first day of the month we remember all those whom we call saints, those martyred I for their faith, and on the second day of November we remember all those who I have died, especially those we knew and were close to.

Each of these remembrances tend to have negative feelings attached to them relating to the loss we feel but, not just in November, but I hope on every day there is another remembrance of which we are reminded in the Gospel of John, chapter 3 verse 16. "So God loved the world, that he gave his only begotten Son, to the end that all that believe in him should not perish, but have everlasting life."




November letter from the Vicar

My subject this month is very easy, I want to say THANK YOU. Thank you for the warmth and generosity sharing in the celebration of 40 years of ordained ministry back in June. I deeply appreciate the many messages and gifts which marked this milestone.

Amongst the many cards and messages of support were two gift vouchers from our parishes. One for books and the other for garden centres. I'll come onto the garden centre one in a bit because there's news to tell....

The books - During the summer I had a morning in Chester so wandered into Waterstones and came out clutching a treasury of writing.



Woodston – The biography of an English Farm, by John Lewis-Stempel. He is of my favourite authors, described as a farmer (Herefordshire), historian and Britain's favourite nature writer. But in my view he isn't an author you can fit into any category, his writing ranges over such a wealth of topics. The one thing you can say about him is that he is passionate about the lives of farming communities who have shaped our landscape and how our wider community lives. (I have nearly finished it but it is one of those books you don't want to finish so I am rationing myself.)

Not yet read (perhaps the best kind of book).

Raising Hare by Chloe Dalton – shortlisted for the Women's Prize for 2025 non-fiction.

The English Soul by Peter Ackroyd – an exploration of how English Christianity has developed over the past 1,400 years.

These Silent Mansions by Jean Sprackland – about graveyards, those places which matter so much and need so much commitment to preserve, yet which are so often overlooked, not least by the leadership of the Church.

Kilvert's Diary – by, of course, Francis Kilvert. A 19th century rural clergyman whose diary I read many years ago in a borrowed edition and which deserves revisiting. I'm not sure he'd get on too well in the modern church. (If you've read it you'll understand.)

Hedgelands by Christopher Hart – Hedges are not just part of the landscape, they are a critical habitat and also have a story to tell of how our society has changed. Having lived in houses with large hedges that need to be maintained I have a love/hate relationship with hedges. (In Woodston John Lewis-Stempel has much to say about hedges, how the Enclosure Acts affected rural people, how to age a hedge by the species growing in it, what may be found in hedges from generations preceding us.)

The Moneyless Man by Mark Boyle – essential reading for anyone tied into the Church of England Pension Scheme!

Such riches. THANK YOU.

And the garden voucher....

Well, one of the objectives of my sabbatical was to sell a rental house near the university in Chester and buy a house for us to live in ourselves. The rental was a three-bed terrace with no garden, parking or garage. We were looking for a three bed with a garage and, because we have friends and family who need one, a downstairs loo. To be honest, thinking we could do both within twelve weeks seemed a bit optimistic but by the grace of God we have done both. After many, many hours scouring Rightmove, more than several viewings which were eye-opening and at times rather disconcerting, and a couple of really frustrating near misses, we have found a house which ticks all the boxes. It just so happens to be almost halfway between both our daughters as well. Ten minutes one way, fifteen the other.

Our new home needs a little TLC, not least the garden. Let's just say the previous owners weren't outdoor people. So the garden voucher will be put to very good use. THANK YOU.
