Back in 2022, the Mothers' Union July meeting was to take the form of a Summer Outing – a two-hour cruise on the River Dee with Chester Boats, from The Groves. All was booked, but two days before the date, weather forecasters started to talk of 40-degree heat and the press was full of recommendations to stay indoors.

We cancelled; the company was very understanding, we promised to rebook as soon as possible and the outing was rescheduled for the same Tuesday in 2023.

The forecasters this year predicted tempest, storm and wind and, once more, they were not wrong. It was dry when we left Whitegate but en route to Chester, the rains came and didn't let up. Our hardy group arrived in plenty of time for departure, in fact there was time enough for coffee before embarkation. The vessel wasn't the one we'd expected, but it was all undercover – or so we thought.

We set sail, all sitting together in the bow with an excellent view of the river. The commentary was clear and fascinating, full of little-known facts about the landmark buildings lining the banks as we headed out towards Eccleston. The many references to the renowned architect, John Douglas, were of particular interest to us as he was of course responsible for designing and supervising the reconstruction of St Mary's, Vale Royal Abbey and many other properties in our area.

It soon became clear that the Perspex canopy above and around us was not designed by anyone of that calibre. As the deluge continued, water first trickled then poured through gaps in the panels – running down to fall onto a fuse box in the bow – and rapidly and constantly mopped up by our efficient team using kitchen roll brought along by Margaret in her picnic bag. Next, Rose began to feel rising damp on her right side. Resourceful, as farmers are, she found that by pressing the handle of her walking stick onto one of the window panels, she was able to keep the flood at bay. She remained in that position throughout, much like the young Dutch lad who kept his finger in the hole in the dyke!

Thanks to those efforts, we were never in danger of sinking. We ate our picnic, chatted and joked. Our boat, the Jackie, turned round once we reached the replica of Thomas Telford's Iron Bridge, at Eccleston, and the fun and fellowship continued all the way back to The Groves. It was an eventful, grand day out and proof that the Mothers' Union motto could be that of the Scouting movement – Be Prepared!

#### All Change...

Several weeks ago, I was sitting in the leavers' assembly at school as the children celebrated the time they had shared together and all they had achieved. As they tearfully said "goodbye", Paul reminded

them to "be more dragonfly", facing change and embracing everything new. Even with the very

rainy summer, I have been lucky enough to observe a dragonflies in my garden, which gave me pause for thought.

As we come to September, there is much change. The nights begin to draw in, the bright greens give way to autumn golds, reds, and browns. The debate begins about when to turn the heating back on! The lazy summer gives way to parents frantically replacing uniform, shoes, school bags and lunch boxes. Children return to school – to a new class, a new teacher, some a new school or college, with new journeys, different routines to learn or a new way of doing things. Some parents will be making the return to work. For some that change is exciting, for others it can be quite daunting.

The last few weeks have involved several changes for me. I completed my time at theological college. After nearly a year and a half, I said "goodbye" to the lovely people at St. John's, Sandiway. Next came the excitement of being ordained - adjusting to being "Reverend", being seen differently by some. And of course, settling into Whitegate and Little Budworth. Like the delight the dragonfly finds in the beauty of ninety primary colours rather than three, it has been a delight to be sent here. Each day as I drive in, the countryside is breathtaking, but what has really moved me, and helped me settle in so quickly, is the generosity and love shown in your welcome.

I am always moved when I read the account of the Last Supper in John 13. As Jesus knew he was about to die in the ultimate act of love, he could be forgiven for putting himself first. Instead, he removed his garments, bent down like a slave, and washed the dirty, smelly feet of his disciples. He then commanded them, "As I have loved you, so you must love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you love one another." (John 13:34-35).

As Jesus showed his love by serving the needs of others, when we see people in times of change, struggle, or any kind of need, we are called to do the same. Not just to be "nice" but to speak openly of God's abundant love for all his creation – especially for the 1.5 million in the diocese who do not yet know God. As we grow and change together, my prayer for us all is that we may mirror for ourselves and others the immeasurable love, generosity, and hospitality of God, that all may come to love and trust him.

#### □ New PCC Secretary

September brings that "new term" feeling that's never quite forgotten from our schooldays. With the new term, on 5<sup>th</sup> September we have the first meeting of the Parochial Church Council since June and a new PCC Secretary, Roger Wilkes, who was voted in at that last meeting. Since Roger is fairly new to St Mary's, we asked if he'd like to introduce himself. Here below, you'll read the outline he provided.

Roger, thank you for this pen portrait, and for taking on this responsibility for St Mary's Whitegate.

Born in Birmingham, Roger won an alto choral exhibition to Clare College, Cambridge, where he read music; holder of a further music degree from London University, he is also an honorary Fellow of the Guild of Church Musicians. After graduating, he served as an alto lay clerk in the choirs of Southwell (Notts.) and Ely cathedrals. Though initially a music librarian, most of Roger's professional career was spent in adult education; from 1974 to 1990 he was staff tutor in music at Manchester's College of Adult Education, while, for several years from 1993, he taught at the Wilmslow



Guild, and, as an associate lecturer, for the universities of Manchester, Liverpool and Keele, and, between 1994 and 2010, for the Open University. Roger has a special interest in 'early' (16th and early 17th century) music both British and Continental; in November 1977 he co-founded the North West Early Music Forum, of which he has been President since 1985. Roger is married to Val who, with him, also sings in the St Mary's church choir.
