#### A verse for OCTOBER

Deuteronomy Ch 26: verses 1-2 I

Moses, speaking to the people of Israel, said: "When you have entered the land the Lord your God is giving you as an inheritance and have taken possession of it and settled in it, take some of the first-fruits of all that you produce from the soil of the land the Lord your God is giving you and put them in a basket."

At this season of harvest, we reflect on all the good things God has given us, and on how I we are called to respond. The first fruits represent the best of the crop, the most I delicious. They are not just a few mouldy potatoes from the bottom of the bag after I all the good ones have been eaten.

Our response should be about prioritising our time, and our money. It's perhaps about blocking out a certain time once week to do something in our local community before putting other things in the diary. It's perhaps about setting up a standing order to give a certain amount of money to a charity, so that the money which we give is not simply the loose change in our pocket or a random donation on a card machine. Moses wants the people to make their gratitude to God a priority, not an afterthought. The same applies to us.

October is that time when the days are getting cooler and nights are starting to draw in early, and by the end of the month, we'll be racing round the house putting the multitude of clocks back (though I get in trouble for always neglecting to reset the car clock!) and enjoying an extra hour of sleep before we get up for church.

It was only as I got older that I understood the notion of measuring and naming time and manipulating it to suit our needs. As humans, we are obsessed by measuring time. The first calendars were lunar and can be traced back as long as 6,000 years ago. The first clocks were a form of sundial, found in Egypt and Babylon. Championed by William Willett, a builder from Kent, British Summer Time was first introduced in the UK during the Summertime Act of 1916, as a response to the need for energy conservation during World War One. By changing the clocks one hour, there was more daylight for recreation, improving health, and saving the country money in lighting costs. It was a clever way to conserve coal supplies. In World War Two, the UK even moved to Double British Summer Time to conserve fuel.

There has been much debate over whether to keep the system, with claims of energy saving and reduction in traffic accidents... but there is no pleasing everyone. Ecclesiastes 3:1-8 talks of a time for everything and a season for every activity under heaven. But have you ever thought about how God sees time? In our prayers, we say "Glory to the Father and to the Son and to the Holy Spirit; as it was in the beginning, is now and shall be for ever." There was never a time when God wasn't, and there will never be a time when God isn't.

God exists outside of time, but in his abundant love for us, he never leaves us. We read in the book of Genesis how God promises Abraham, that through his descendants, all creation will know his blessing. Mankind did not use the time God gave well, but in his love, God revealed his very nature in his Son, Jesus, who gave hope as he taught of the coming of God's kingdom and promised that he would return. He left us with the Holy Spirit so that we would not be alone.

So, as we move through the month of October, whether mourning the loss of long summer days, or looking forward to crisp autumnal days, a cheeky hot chocolate and snuggling up in front of a fire, do take time to marvel at the change of seasons. Appreciate the level of God's care in creation and know that he loves and cares for you deeply. It is worth spending a few minutes reflecting on the famous hymn by Thomas Chisholm, a Methodist minister (1923), based on Lamentations, Chapter 3, verses 22-23:

"Great is Thy faithfulness O God my Father, There is no shadow of turning with Thee; Thou changest not, Thy compassions they fail not, As Thou hast been Thou forever wilt be."

Remember that each season, our time and how we use it, is precious to us and precious to God. I pray we will all use our time well this Autumn, to God's glory.
